Senate tackles budget amendments

Editor's note: State Sen. Buddy Carter, R- Pooler, will be reporting each week during the legislative session. The session began Jan.14 and is expected to last until the latter days of March.

Tuesday, Feb. 19: After a long weekend at home, we're back in business this morning and our first action is to pass the 2013 amended budget out of the Appropriations Committee. The state's budget runs on a fiscal year from July 1-June 30 and has to be amended midyear primarily to account for revenue adjustments and K-12 student population growth.

As we go into session later in the morning, we have two bills on our calendar including SB 117, which amends the "Call before you Dig" laws. The revisions and updates to this code section regarding blasting and excavation,

reflect changes in industry standards and clarify industry terms.

The other bill, SB 81, shortens the length of the legal ginseng harvesting season by changing the start date from Aug. 15 to

Sept 1. While some people may feel we should be spending our time on more important issues, for those who make a living doing this, it is extremely important. Ginseng is harvested primarily in the national forests and berries must be replanted to sustain the crop. The berries are not mature enough in August to reproduce and therefore the season needs to be delayed until September. We recognize a number of groups today, including the Future Farmers of America, Toccoa-Stephens County and the restaurant industry.

Wednesday, Feb. 20: After two early committee meetings, we are in at 10 a.m. and I have my first bill of the year on the floor for consideration. SB 11 re-establishes the Georgia Geospatial Advisory Council, a very important part of making certain our local, regional and state agencies are coordinating and organizing our geographic information throughout the state. This is particularly important in flood map modernization as insurance costs and building requirements hinge on these findings.

Also today we pass SB 69, making information supplied by children who report abuses to the Department of Juvenile Justice confidential, and SB 86, amending the Family Violence Act. SB 86 allows law enforcement officers



projects. "Every year, on Aug. 11, (8-11), pipelines and other underground utilities across the nation take the opportunity to remind their communities about the importance of calling 811 to prevent injury, damage and death, from hitting underground lines," Prather said.

Calls to 811 are free and should be made at least two days before digging. The calls connect individuals to their local One Call Center, which gathers information about the planned digging project and notifies public utilities in the area.

Professional locate technicians are then dispatched to mark the location of all underground lines with paint or flags before any digging

begins. "Failure to call 811 before digging results in more than 200,000 unintentional hits annually across the United States. That translates to roughly one unintentional hit every three minutes, many of which require the response of emergency responders and unnecessarily tie up commu-nity resources. These situations could easily be prevented by one simple call to 811," Prather said.

The Georgia Association of Fire Chiefs is partnering with pipeline operators across the state to promote 811 awareness Sunday, or

Lincoln should inspire lawmakers

A few years ago, I read "Team of Rivals," which documents Abraham Lincoin's road to the White House and how he ultimately chose campaign rivals to serve in his presidential cabinet. He made friends with his political enemies, which is a rare trait much needed in today's political arena.

More recently, I saw the movie "Lincoln," which covered the challenges of passing the Constitutional amendment that abolished slavery. In both instances, I was impressed with Lincoln's dedication to the Constitution, his unusual ability to see beyond himself and choose what was best for our country and his perseverance to make better the lives of those enslaved, setting our country apart as a true place of freedom.

I again thought about Lincoln when I recently listened to Dr. Michael Youssef, pastor of The Church of the Apostles, share a "chaplain of

the day" message with the Senate. He pointed out that we can choose a Machiavellian-style of leadership, which means leading with force, deception, coercion, manipulation and even elimination of rivals in order to stay in power, or we can choose to lead as Jesus did by serving, encouraging and loving others. Lincoln was a servant leader. Personally, my hope is to serve like Jesus even though it is often difficult.

Our primary job as legislators is to create laws that our citizens are to live under. It jokingly has been said that the people are most in danger when the Legislature is in session. This year has been the slowest year for legislation being introduced in my memory, so the people should rest easy. The only thing Georgia lawmakers are required to pass during a session is the budget. I wish the U.S. Senate, which hasn't passed a budget in more than four years, was required to do the same. Each year in Georgia, we actually pass two budgets. One budget is based on projections, and another addresses changes that may need to be made due to actual changes in revenue collections, student enrollment or the economy.

For fiscal year 2014, Gov. Nathan Deal has proposed a \$19.8 billion budget, which is a slight increase from last year's budget. Our revenue-shortfall reserve, or "rainy-day" fund, stands at \$378 million. This means that, in the case of an emergency, our state could continue operations for seven days. We are one of only seven states to maintain an AAA bond rating.

The following are a few additional bills passed this session:

- Senate Bill 24, also known as the Hospital Medicaid Financing Program Act, authorizes the Department of Community Health to establish a financial structure to protect Georgia's health-care system and obtain additional federal matching dollars for the state's Medicaid program.
- SB 65 authorizes licensed professional counselors to perform emergency evaluations of individuals
 who are mentally ill or alcohol- or drug-dependent and to issue a certificate stating that such a person
 requires involuntary treatment. This is in response to those children who recently were killed by people
 with serious mental conditions that made them a danger to themselves and others.

Natural gas, America's most popular home heating fuel, is increasingly popular for use by homeowners, schools, businesses, factories and electric power-generation plants because it is efficient, clean, reliable and a relative bargain compared to alternative energy sources.

In our community, City of Cochran provides natural gas to more than 1300 customers through a network of underground distribution lines. Main gas lines, typically 2-inch in diameter, branch into household service lines which are typically half-inch to three quarter-inch in diameter and buried 12-to 18-inches below the surface.

To protect you and others in the community; federal and state government, along with your utility provider have made your safety a high priority. Any time you dig or move earth in any way, you are required to "Call Before You Dig 48 hours before beginning any digging. When you call **Georgia 811**, they will contact utility owners who will locate all buried utility lines on your property, so you can safely dig and prevent a potentially hazardous condition. Failure to use the 811 system is a known cause of pipeline accidents. Calling before you dig can prevent a costly or even deadly mistake.

Natural gas is a colorless, odorless gas; however, a chemical that smells like rotten eggs is added to help detect a possible leak. Some of the signs of a gas leak include seeing bubbling water, hearing a hissing or blowing sound from a pipeline or appliance, dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green area, or dirt or dust blowing from the ground, or the smell of rotten eggs.

If you smell gas, or just think you might be smelling gas, leave the area immediately and call your local gas provider at 478-934-6346 or 911 from a neighboring home or business. Never tum on or off switches or use a flashlight or phone in the presence of the gas smell, because an electric spark could ignite the gas, causing an explosion.

Do your part to familiarize yourself and your family with these natural gas safety tips and continue to enjoy the value, comfort and benefits of America's cleanest, most efficient energy source!

When calling 811, residents are connected

to their local one-call center, which notifies the utility of the intent to dig.

Professional locators are then sent to the site to mark the locations of underground lines with color-coded spray paint, flags or stakes. Once lines have been accurately marked, residents are urged to use hand tools to dig carefully.

Safe digging saves lives-call 811

with the cooler temperatures of fall arriving early, many of us will take advantage of working on outdoor home improvement projects. Whether mending an old fence, preparing the soil for a fall broccoli garden, or installing outdoor lighting, digging can pose serious risks if not done properly.

Three years ago, Paul McCorkle, a McDuffie County commissioner in Thomson, Ga., was injured and his 23-year-old son killed when McCorkle was grading his son's property with a bulldozer and accidentally struck a liquid propane gas line two feet underground, according to a report in The Augusta Chronicle.

In Dawson County, like everywhere else in Georgia, it is best to dial 8-1-1 first. Atlanta Gas Light reminds homeowners and professional contractors of the importance of dialing 8-1-1 to help prevent serious injury, costly property damage and inconvenient utility service interruptions.

"While August is a great calendar reminder of the importance of calling 8-1-1, we work year round to promote safe digging practices around underground facilities," said Bryan Batson, president of Atlanta Gas Light. "We believe that making a quick and easy call can help maintain safe, reliable service and protect our customers, employees and the communities we serve."

Batson is right.

Here's how it works: when you call 8-1-1, you are connected to a call center, which notifies the appropriate utility companies of the intent to dig. Professional locators are then sent to the requested digging site to mark the approximate locations of underground lines with color-coded spray paint, flags or stakes that correspond to the utility.

The color used for natural gas is yellow.
Once lines have been accurately marked,
residents are urged to use the appropriate
methods, which may include hand tools, to
dig carefully around or near underground
facilities such as water, cable, telephone,
gas and electric lines.

If a natural gas line is accidentally damaged or the distinct odor of gas is present, call your provider from a safe distance, and tell others in the area about the leak.





SENATE PASSES FY 13 AMENDED BUDGET

The Senate passed their committee substitute to HB 105, the FY 2013 Supplemental Budget, totaling \$19.3 billion. The Senate substitute is similar to both the Governor's recommendation and the version passed by the House, but does contain some key differences. The largest addition is the midyear education adjustment of \$167.6 million, which funds K-12 growth. The Senate increased the House's restorations of cuts to School Nutrition Programs for a total restoration of \$979,000. The Senate version also added almost \$4 million for state charter system grants. The Senate also restored the \$2.2 million in cuts to Georgia Gwinnett College. The budget reductions to Accountability Courts were also lessened in the Senate version. The bill will now go to a conference committee where members of the House and Senate will negotiate an agreement on the bill to send to the Governor.

Senate Bill 86 would strengthen current laws regarding family violence orders.

Senate Bill 117 provides amendments to the "Call Before You Dig" which was a collaborative effort between 18 different construction-related institutions and the result of over 30 meetings. This is the first series of revisions since the original bill passed in 2005.

For the next several months, I will be spending a lot of time at the Capitol working on behalf of you this Session. If there are any issues you wish to have addressed, I would love to hear from you. The Georgia Dig Law requires both professional excavators and homeowners to have utility lines marked before performing any mechanized digging, demolition, or working within 10 feet of overhead power lines. Call 811 even if you plan to manually dig. By knowing where underground utility lines are buried before digging will help protect you from injury and/or expense.

Calling the Utilities Protection Center before digging is a service free of charge. Call at least 48 hours, but no more than 10 working days, excluding weekends and legal holidays, before starting your digging project. Calling 811 starts the process to get your underground utility lines marked.

The single greatest cause of accidents regarding natural gas pipelines is digging by third party excavators. Third Party refers to those other than the pipeline operator. Please report any suspected signs of damage to our pipeline. If you strike a natural gas pipeline, please immediately notify us even if the damage seems to be minor, such as a scrape or dent.

Utility Director Meecham retiring after 20 years of service

COVINGTON — Maybe city of Covington Utilities Director Bill Meecham was destined for his line of work.

"I blew my first fuse when I was 5 years old," he said. "I made an extension cord and plugged it in for the first time and nothing bad happened, but I didn't realize I needed to keep some stuff separated a little better than I had. I plugged it in a second time and fire blew out and the lights in the room went out."

Nowadays, Meecham makes sure the city has enough power to keep the lights on.

Though he's been with the city of Covington for 20 years, Meecham still considers himself a relative newcomer. Noting that some employees came to the city immediately after high school, "20 years means that I'm basically a teenager in the crowd," he said.

The teenager is retiring in the next month or so after a successful run in charge of the city's gas and electric departments.

According to former City Manager Steve Horton, Meecham has "brought quality and competent leadership to the City of Covington utility system."

"Many system upgrades have occurred during Bill's tenure. Bill's technical expertise, his ability to create relevant affiliations and relationships, his dedication and his integrity are personal attributes that Bill has used day in and day out to benefit the Covington utility system and its many customers," Horton said. "Because of Bill's leadership, the city utility system is better prepared to face what is believed to be an optimistic yet uncertain future. It has been a real pleasure to work with Bill for the last 20 years. I, along with many others at the city, have learned a lot from Bill. The city can get another utilities director, but not another Bill. Bill is a good man and friend. He will be greatly missed."

Meecham said he'll stay on until a replacement is hired, and expects that to happen in August.

Meecham was hired in 1993 to train to replace retiring Electric Superintendent Billy Davis. As utilities director, Meecham oversees the gas and electric departments and the PEG channels. He primarily works on power supply issues and expanding the city's existing systems.

Meecham said he's especially enjoyed working on rate and service proposals for local industries. Industrial development is a team effort, he said.

"Job growth is very important to the city. I think it offers both the city and county an opportunity to improve the economic demographics," he said.

Meecham also said he's proud to have overseen the upgrade of the electric system, including the addition of new substations and reconstruction of older parts of the system, as well as the expansion of the gas system. He said he's also enjoyed working with city crews.

After retirement, Meecham plans to make some improvements to his property in north Newton, do some traveling and devote more time to photography and model railroading.

Meecham was born in Savannah and grew up in Hinesville. He holds three degrees from what is now Southern Polytechnic State University in Marietta: associates and bachelor's degrees in industrial engineering and an associate's degree in electrical engineering.

Prior to working for the city of Covington, Meecham worked as a disc jockey for a radio station in Marietta, for Western Electric Company and Marietta Power.

He previously served as a member of the Electric Cities of Georgia Board of Directors, including two years as chairman, and as a member of the Utility Protection Center of Georgia (now known as Georgia 811) Board of Directors, including one year as chairman.

This year has been the slowest year for legislation being introduced in my memory, so the people should rest easy.

The only law in Georgia we are required to pass during a legislative session is the budget. I wish the U.S. Senate, which hasn't passed a budget in more than four years, would be required to do the same. Each year in Georgia, we actually pass two budgets. One budget is based on projections and one is used to amend changes in mid-year that may be needed due to actual changes in revenue collections, student enrollment, or the economy Over the last eight years, these mid-year changes have been to make additional cuts due to revenue shortfalls. Last Friday we passed the mid-year budget. Unfortuconsists of some additional funding for education and Medicaid but otherwise three percent cuts to most other agencies. The mid-year budget passed with a unanimous vote. Right now, this would be unheard of in Washington; democrats and republicans actually working together to agree on a budget.





freely acknowledge myself the servant of the people, according to the bond of service the United States Constitution: and that, as such, I am responsible to them."

Lincoln never forgot that he worked for the people. He never attempted to change the Constitution to serve his own personal means or to serve only those who supported him. He strove for equality among the people and believed that the founding fathers knew what they were doing the first time.

I thought again about Lincoln when I recently listened to Dr. Michael Youssef, pastor of The Church of the

the Day message with the Senate. He pointed out that we can choose a Machiavellian type leadership which strives to lead with force, deception, coercion, manipulation and even elimination of a rival in order to stay in power, or we can choose to lead as Jesus would by serving, encouraging and loving others. Lincoln was a servant leader. Personally, my hope is to serve like Jesus even though it is often difficult.

The founding fathers realized one thing for sure; they understood the depravity of human nature and the desire in each of us toward seeking our own interest. They understood the danger of power, which is why they created a system of servants representing people with certain checks and balances rather than a House of Lords. It can be easy in politics to forget one is a servant of the people, espe-



Contacting Georgia 811, either by dialing 811 or going online to www.Georgia811.com, is only the first step in safe digging. After waiting the required amount of time for all the underground lines to be marked you may begin your project, but what do you do if those marks are right where

you need to dig?

Gerogia's Dig Law, Georgia Utility Facility Protection Act (GUFPA) has established a tolerance zone of 24 inches on either side of the outer edge of the utility facility. Facilities vary in size greatly and because locating underground facilities is an inexact science, the actual size of the tolerance zone is impossible to determine without exposing the facility. GUFPA requires that the excavator must exercise reasonable care when excavating or blasting within the Tolerance Zone. Hand digging or other non-intrusive methods are required when excavating in the tolerance zone: damage to facilities must be avoided. This includes, but is not limited to: Digging by hand, Pot holing, Vacuum excavation and soft digging methods.

According to the Georgia 811 Utilities Protection Center, failure to call before digging results in more than 200,000 unintentional contacts with underground lines annually across the country, or once every three minutes.

The "Call Before You Dig" law requires that, before beginning any mechanized digging or excavation project, workers must contact Georgia 811 to have all underground utility lines (often including power, communications, gas and water lines) marked. Having the location of underground infrastructure marked helps prevent unintended service disruptions, injuries to workers, possible repair costs and fines. The law applies to individuals working on smaller projects, as well as large contractors and companies.

"The Georgia 811 program is an incredibly useful and important tool for all Georgians," said Danny Lindsey, vice president of transmission for Georgia Power. "At Georgia Power, we encourage our customers to contact Georgia 811 not only before they dig, but also if they are going to be working within 10 feet of an overhead electrical line carrying more than 750 volts as the service can help coordinate safeguards for working around these lines." Notification must be made at least 48 hours, but no more than 10 working days, in advance of any mechanized digging or excavation work. Georgia residents can call 8-1-1 or (800)-282-7411, or make a request electronically at www.Georgia811.com. Once a request is made, Georgia 811 will notify affected member utility companies, which will send a professional technician to identify and mark the location of underground lines with colored paint or flags.

Although not required by law, Georgians can also contact Georgia 811 in advance of smaller, non-mechanized digging projects around the home such as installing a fence, building a deck, installing a swing set or planting trees. The service can help homeowners ensure that projects are safe and located an appropriate distance from underground utilities.

"I applaud the passage of Senate Bill 117," said Sen. Jeffares. "This legislation is important to maintaining our state's utility infrastructure and protecting our state from preventable service interruptions due to excavation accidents."

The Georgia Utility Facility Protection Act (GUFPA) was established to protect the underground utility infrastructure of Georgia. It was enacted by the General Assembly in July 2000 to provide for the protection of the buried utility facility infrastructure within the State of Georgia.

GUFPA mandates that, before starting any mechanized digging or excavation work, persons must contact Georgia 811 at least 48 hours, but no more than 10 working days in advance to have utility lines marked. This law covers activities such as excavation, tunneling, grading, boring, demolition or any similar work. The call center dates back to 1974.

In March 2005, the Federal Communications Commission approved the use of 811 as a national "Call Before You Dig" telephone number. This three-digit number is designed to connect anyone intending to dig with the appropriate state's buried cable notification center. These centers assist with having buried utilities located and marked at the worksite – at no cost to the caller – helping prevent undesired service disruptions.

This legislation makes changes to existing law by changing the definitions for "excavation," "farming activities," white lining, and "milling." For additional information about specific revisions, please see Senate Bill 117.

Senate Bill 117 will now travel to the House of Representatives for consideration.


